Minutes of the General Meeting August 26th 2016.

The meeting commenced at 7:35 pm. Attendance as per the sign on book.

Apologies: Lyndon and Garth Smith, Andrew Holloway, Bob Moore.

New members: Nil

Minutes of the June 24th 2016 meeting, published in 'Airwaves' and taken as read, was put to the meeting as true and correct. Motion moved by: Dick Hall Seconded by: Eric Pond Vote taken: passed.

Business arising from the previous meeting: none.

President's report:

Barry informed the members of his meeting with MBRC staff regarding conditions on the pending lease for Gibson field. They have a concern about our members being notified of the mosquito spraying chopper in the area. The lease is still being drawn up. At the conclusion of the general meeting we will have the annual general meeting and all committee positions will be declared vacant.

Treasurer's report:

The financial statement was read by the treasurer. The club's cash position is good with membership fees being paid recently. An audit of the bank accounts is going to be done.

CFI report:

A few members have recently gained their wings.

A night fly at the Sid Bray field is going to be organised.

Field report for Bray field:

The generator is due for a service.

Some weed spraying needs to be done on the next working bee along with a general tidy up.

Field report for Gibson field:

There was a good roll up at the last working bee with some weed spraying and grass cutting along the fence lines being done. Also some paving work was carried out. On the next working bee there is some fencing to be done and rocks to be cleared away.

The kitchen work is still in progress.

Fuel report:

The president mentioned that more keys for the fuel shed need to be available as some members are missing out on getting fuel at times.

Motion moved to accept reports was called: Moved by : Eric Pond. Seconded by : Ian Swadling.

Vote taken: passed.

General Business:

There was some discussion on MBRC.'s requirements for club members to be notified when mosquito spraying was to be carried out. The procedure will be written into the new lease.

The president advised that the council required the building specifications for the new shade stands at Gibson field. Also to obtain a grant from the council, they require the club to contribute 25% of the total cost. The president moved a motion to allocate 25% of the cost of the shade stands, about \$11k. Seconded by: Ian Swadling. Vote taken: passed.

More discussion followed on the council grant and it was advised that the present round of grants was closing and the club would miss out. The club would then have to wait until June 2017 before getting the shade stands. This would mean going through another full summer without proper shade at Gibson field. More members are using the field and organised events like IMAC and war birds need more bays than what is available.

It was discussed that it would be better to go ahead with the shade stands funded by the club, as the club is in a good financial position, and apply for a grant from MAAA / MAAQ. Motion moved by: Dan Imhoff. Seconded by: Graham Tattersall. Vote taken: passed.

As there was no further business to discuss the meeting was closed at 8:30 pm.

"Biggles" Murphy Flies a Gyrocopter

I have had my son Peter, visiting me from The Netherlands and took them down to visit son John who lives at Duranbah, near Tweed. While there they decided to go whale watching from Brunswick Heads. I was not going to get bounced around in a shark cat so visited Tyagarah aerodrome to see if there was any action there.

Got talking to an Oliver Mueller who operates Byron Bay Gyrocopters. One thing led to another and I found myself in a Gyrocopter doing a 'trial introductory flight" around Byron Bay Light House while also watching for whales, saw at least 5 of them, a pod of dolphins, a shark, and I think turtles. This is a good way to go whale watching, you do not get wet or bounced about.



The differences between a Trike and a Gyro are a lot. I like the Gyro, you fly it like a normal 3 axis plane, with a pause to pre-rotate the rotor to about 300 - 400 revs before take off, then normal take-off speed, approx same distance run as a Trike. Oliver demonstrate the virtues of the Gyro by closing the throttle and circling down easily to line up an approach on the beach before powering up.



I found it much easier to control than the Trike, ailerons easy with minimum input required, I was not blown about nearly as much, in fact the open cockpit is a nice place to be. On landing he again did a power off approach all the way to touchdown with a full flair.

To say I was impressed is an understatement. I also enquired as to maintenance, especially the main rotor and was told that it had a life of 2000 hours, I was expecting 500 hours at

the max. The Gyro uses more fuel, about 20 litres per hour as against 15 max for the Trike but carries more fuel (all Mogas.)

Now I have some thinking to do, I do not know of any people up here that teach Gyros. I will talk my CFI John Cresswell into buying one, there is a reputed "good" one for sale for approx \$55 or \$60,000 in Byron.

I can dream can't I?
