## What to do in the event of a snake bite.

Snakes have been on the move at Saambr with one of them hitching a ride in the engine bay of one of our members recently.

In the event of one of someone being bitten this information has been obtained online.

- \* Lay or sit the person down with the bite below the level of the heart. Stay as still as possi ble. Don't move a muscle, because moving moves the venom through the body.
- \* Try and identify the snake if possible.
- \* Tell them to stay calm and still.
- Call 000.
- \* Cover the bite with a clean, dry dressing.
- \* Do not wash the bite area. Venom left on the skin and clothing can help identify the snake.
- \* Apply a compression bandage as you would for an ankle or wrist sprain above the bite site between it and the heart.
- \* Do not cut the wound.
- Do not suck the venom out.

# Repairing fibreglass cowls.

I can offer some advice on repairing fibre glass cowls.

The method I use is firstly cut and trim out the damaged areas and then rub back the paint

on the outside about a centimetre back from the hole/s. Also rub back the inside with light wet and dry. I then get plasticine and make up wads that are about 10 mm thick that will cover the hole/s in the cowl and then shape it to match the cowl contours exactly, using my fingers and a small painter's trowel.

The plasticine will stick to the fibreglass cowl provided it has been well washed with a petrol-soaked rag to remove any oil. I carefully paint fibreglass PVC mould release just on the plasticine and lay up several layers of 6 oz. cloth using West Systems 105 epoxy resin with 206 hardeners.

Blend it into the sanded area on the outside of the cowl. Allow a good 24 hours drying and then sand with 3M "Sandblaster" 180 and 240 grit paper.



Pull out the plasticine and get rid of any sticking to the cowl with a rag dampened with petrol. This 3M sandpaper is used dry and does not clog up, so goes a long way and worth the extra money.

Paint over the repairs with enamel or acrylic two pack paint. Ordinary household enamel can be perfectly matched by your local paint shop using computer scanning. I have recently repaired a P-47 cowl plus the new cowl for my Pacer, all sanded to a baby's bum (technical term) finish using the above sandpaper.

I have showed the P-47 cowl to several people, and none of them has picked the repaired area.

Hope this info is some help to you.

## **Grant application**

Early November an application for a community grant was lodged with the Gambling Community Benefit Fund (GCBF). If granted, we'll know some time in January which would allow us to complete concreting works around the perimeter of the pits which requires a 213metre collar skirt around the edges.

This would help pay for concreting, a pump, machinery hire, an engineer, a certifier, wages for trades people and a large poly water tank.

The other requirement is a 26 metre path from the club house to the toilet block and a dedicated disabled parking space which would be at the rear to provide easy access to the clubhouse.

**NB:** It's important to note this work can only be carried out by licensed trades people and not Saambr members. This is to comply with certification requirements, and cannot be part of working bee arrangements.
